International children's entertainer Rosie Emery is a singer/songwriter, environmental educator and new media producer specializing in teaching children how all of life is interconnected, through the songs she writes and the programs she produces.


Since July 2004, Rosie has been partnered with WGCU Public Media (PBS) in Fort Myers, Florida to develop and produce their *Curious Kids* TV/Web and outreach programs which can be viewed at: www.wgcu.org: these include the *Curious Kids Nature Club, Get Up, Get Out, Get Active* and *Safety Rules*. As the *Curious Kids* Ambassador, Rosie performs her up-beat music concerts at WGCU community events as well as in regional schools. She is currently developing a new *Curious Kids*! initiative which will be featured at Southwest Florida's brand new Children's Museum, *C'mon*. In addition to her children's work, Rosie has written and produced many of the *Green Living* segments for WGCU's signature television show *Connect!*

Rosie founded and produced the critically acclaimed *Rainbow Road Tour*, an Eco-rock production that visited hundreds of schools across Canada and the northern United States from 1997 - 2002. No stranger to television, she has sappeared in specials on Canadian CTV, WTN and YTV as well as on the Hawaiian PBS *Kids Science* show.

With 20 years of experience touring schools and developing programs in Canada and the United States, Rosie has developed her own brand of unique environmental educational resources. She shares these with educators through her presentations as a Keynote and Guest Lecture Speaker at educational conferences and also in workshops for community and educational institutions. Building on this body of work, Rosie is now partnering with the Y des Femmes (Women's Y) de Montreal to develop an innovative Wellness resource package for early childhood educators that synthesizes environmental education, nutrition and physical activity.

She is the co-creator with JC Little of the *Little Earth Charter*, (now available on DVD www.cinefete.ca), a series of eight animated shorts promoting social responsibility and environmental stewardship to young children

Rosie's 3 CD's and recently published *We're All Interconnected Activity Guide & CD* are available from her website at www.interconnected.ca; her *Dolphin* song is featured on UNESCO's *Earth Charter* CD. Through her live music performances, radio broadcasts, CD's and national television specials, Rosie's musical message of hope, empathy and action has captivated millions of children all over the world.





Environmental songstress and WGCU Public Media Children's Program Producer Rosie Emery was busy giving performances and leading workshops in nine Collier County public elementary schools in September and October.


Emery visited the schools' "Sunrise, Sunset" after-school program on two occasions. First, she performed her self-penned songs that focus on Florida wildlife and habitats to emphasize how all of life on earth is interconnected. Emery performed with guitarist Jeff Key, who is pursuing a master's degree in environmental science at Florida Gulf Coast University.

She returned to each school to lead an interactive workshop featuring an animated "footprint game" that explains energy consumption. Workshop discussion revolved around "how kids can reduce their ecological footprint with a particular emphasis on energy conservation by turning it off," says Emery.

The program was made possible by a \$10,000 gift from an anonymous Collier County donor.

"It was a great experience. The kids had a really good time and enjoyed the shows," says Emery, who is also WGCU's Curious Kids Nature Club Web site ambassador. "The schools were very grateful for the gift."

Here's Rosie!

ROSIE EMERY IS COORDINATING WGCU Public Media's educational outreach campaign called *There's Only One River, Only One Sea*, aimed at increasing public awareness (with an emphasis on school-age children) about the interconnections between lakes, rivers, swamps, canals and the Gulf of Mexico that they feed into. The campaign will run concurrently with the PBS broadcast of the new six-part *Jean-Michel Consteau: Ocean Adventures* series premiering April 5 and 12.

For the past two years, Rosie has worked with WGCU to develop environment-related web and TV content for WGCU's Curious Kids Club, a multi-media project for local children. Now, she's expanding her outreach efforts by coordinating a song-writing contest and an art contest for There's Only One River, which culminates with World Ocean Day Family Festival at Sarasota' Mote Aquarium on June 8. She has organized an April 1 plein air painting event for local children with guest artist Lee Ackert at Six Mile Cypress Slough in Lee County as part of the art contest.


A self-taught musician and songwriter who sings and plays guitar, Rosie has toured hundreds of schools in Canada and the United States with her environmental education music shows. Originally from England, where she grew up in the legendary Sherwood Forest, Rosie has called Canada home for the past 25 years. In 1989, inspired by the need to educate children about the importance of nature, she began to write songs that could be both educational and fun.

Rosie's three children's CD's — We're All Interconnected, Dolphins Teach Us to Play and The Rainbow Road — feature songs such as Mosquito Song, The Recycling Boogie and The Ants. She penned and performed the theme song, Let's Get Curious, for the Curious Kids Club.

"Understanding that we are all interconnected, that all of life is intertwined, is the message that I seek to impart to children," says Emery. "If we are to continue living on this planet in a sustainable manner, then this awareness must be an integral part of our thinking and decision making."

As part of WGCU's Get Up. Get Out. Get Active! campaign, Rosie is producing short IV segments aimed at children to promote eating healthy food and getting active.

"We all eat food, and food is a good example of how we are all interconnected. Our food choices can help to support many aspects of life — buying local produce supports the local economy; buying organic food can help to protect the land and the farm workers from harmful pesticides. Just think about the journey involved to bring food to your plate," she says. "One of the reasons the environment is suffering is because we don't make the connection between our health and the natural world anymore — and that is dangerous for all of us."

Music in the classroom enriches and educates

Parent organization funds performance by environmentalist Rosie Emery By Sylvia Warden

ow more than ever parents have a say in their children's education. Their voices are heard not at school board meetings or at parent-teacher interviews but through their pocket books.

Education funding cuts mean schools can no longer rely on govern-ment money to finance curriculum. Instead parents now pay for text books, pencil crayons and big ticket items like music programs and swimming lessons.

At Cookshire Elementary School parents paid for a recent performance by environmental singer and educator Rosie Emery. With no money in the school's budget for a music program, teachers decided to approach the Parent Participation Organization for money.

Cookshire Elementary isn't alone. Across the Townships and Canada, school boards grappling with funding cuts have had to find alternate sources to pay for music, physical education and art classes. Once taught along side the three Rs, the arts has taken a back seat in the new knowledge economy.
"We couldn't have done this with the

Grade 3 and 4 teacher.

The PPO also pays for each child to receive 30 minutes of musical instruction once a week, after school.

"Three years ago the school board cut our funding for music so we ap-proached the PPO," said Hodge, who also said music, like English, is an important part of a child's education.

Over lunch in the staff room, a handful of teachers discussed how music can enrich a child's life and help them learn.

Teacher Alana Russell said not all students learn from a book, "It (a performance like Emery's) also brings in children who don't learn visually or auditorially. It gives them a chance.'

Shows like Emery's help foster an appreciation for the arts, said Grade 5 and 6 teacher Sandra Henderson .

"The show helps bring culture into the classroom." It can also reinforce what's being studied in the classroom. Hodge said Emery's environmental outlook fits in well with units on mam mals, plants and nature being studied in the primary grades.
Emery's one-hour concert is part

fun, part education. Lyrics describe the environmental problems we face and offer tips on how to make small, but meaningful changes.

Turn it off, a song about conserving energy, tells students when they leave a room turn off the lights.

Those three little words (turn it off) mean a lot to the earth," Emery sings.

A song like The Rainbow Road Song, named after Emery's Rainbow Road Tour, tells students we're all interconnected. What we put in the soil and lakes affects what we eat and can make

us sick or keep us healthy.
Interdependence is a constant theme
of Emery's show. The Montreal-based performer says its one of the most important lessons anyone can learn.


"What you do in your life is what is making a difference," she told the

group of Grade 1 to 6 students.
Emery took that advice to heart and started the Rainbow Road Tour two years ago. In 1997, Emery took the tour across Canada to schools at no charge. Now the tour is part of the Earthvalues Institute, a nonprofit en-

After the concert, Emery held two eco-sessions, where she and the stu-dents worked together to develop recycling plans. Grade 1 and 2 students learned it takes one tree to produce a three-foot pile of newspapers so recy-cling newspapers will help prevent trees from being cut down. Children are the future, Emery said, that's why she sings for them. "People always say what can I do? I say I can do a lot."



WGCU's children's entertainer Rosie Emery will perform her fun children's music about nature at the Conservancy of Southwest Florida's Earth Day 2008 celebration on Saturday, April 19. In addition to live entertainment, the event, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., will

feature a farmer's market, guest speakers, face painting, special exhibits and native plant sales. On Sunday, April 20, noon to 3 p.m., the conservancy will offer educational presentations "designed to remind us that every day is Earth Day." Admission is free both days.
